President Dumond called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. in the Board Room of the Hartland Educational Support Service Center. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Motion by Kenrick, supported by Hemeyer that the agenda for the April 17, 2017 regular meeting be approved, that policy be set aside allowing Item II.D. to be treated as an Action Item, and that public participation be allowed on all items. Motion carried 5-0.

4/17/17 AGENDA APPROVED

Motion by Costa, supported by Kaszyca that the minutes of the March 20, 2017 regular meeting be approved. Motion carried 5-0.

3/20/17 MINUTES APPROVED

Superintendent Hughes reminded everyone of the Building & Site Sinking Fund election May 2, 2017, noting that he, Mr. Bacon, Mr. VanEpps, and Ms. Otis have conducted more than 25 meetings with district and community groups to date, informing about the election. He then introduced Anthony Howerton, Principal of Lakes Elementary School, who noted the artwork around the Boardroom was provided by art teacher Shari Russano's students. Ms. Russano contributed more than 30 pieces of art from her students for the "Got Art?" exhibit at the Howell Opera House. Mr. Howerton introduced teachers Shauna Pietila and Lisa Villar, who have initiated the "Girls' Math Club" at Lakes Elementary. Approximately 20 2nd and 3rd grade girls meet for an hour after school every Monday to play math-related games and discuss different issues relating to math vocabulary, problem-solving, and understanding in order to become more comfortable with math skills. HAPPENINGS AT LAKES ELEM.

Mr. Howerton then introduced the parent volunteers behind Lakes' Highly Capable Cluster Program – Becky Linton and Cathy Pantelas – noting that this program is run entirely by parent volunteers. Ms. Linton and Ms. Pantelas talked about the program, which consists of approximately 34 Lakes students, grades 2 – 4. These students are pulled out for an hour every other Friday for a variety of STEM-centered activities including engineering, physical science, music, writing, and art. Several of the students involved spoke about their favorite activities, noting that this is their favorite part of the school day. Ms. Linton and Ms. Pantelas thanked Mr. Howerton and the Board for their support, noting that this year they actually have a dedicated space to work in and keep their projects.

Hawker for helping with the club, providing curriculum links, and initiating dialog.

Superintendent Hughes then introduced high school Principal David Minsker and Assistant Principal Kate Gregory to talk about the Early/Middle College Program. Mr. Hughes noted that this was a county-wide consortium program and a discussion item later on the agenda that would come back before the Board for action at the May meeting. This program offers students the opportunity to earn a career certification by attending a 5th year of high school. The application for the county has been filed with the

state, and once approved, each district's Board would need to take action for the district to participate. Ms. Gregory showed a sample schedule for the 11th, 12th, and 13th years, noting that students interested in the program would need to commit when registering for their junior year to one of the three certification programs offered: Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN), Machine Tool Tech, or Welding/Die Finisher. The students would participate in "shared time" during their junior year, would be dual-enrolled at LCC or Mott CC their senior year, and would be totally off campus at LCC or Mott for their 5th year. Ms. Gregory noted that these students would not graduate or walk with their class until they completed the 5th year of the program, at which point they would have a career certification in one of the three fields offered. She also noted that EMU has indicated they would transfer the LPN credits to be used toward a 4-year Registered Nurse (RN) degree. Mr. Kaszyca was concerned about the viability of the transfer credits and whether EMU would honor all of the credits. Mr. Minsker noted that while the district can't guarantee credit transfer for any of its shared time or dual enrollment programs, EMU has stated they would transfer credits for this program. Ms. Gregory noted that Livingston County is the first of the 55 counties currently offering Early/Middle College to offer the LPN program. The Board asked how funding would work and Ms. Gregory indicated that the cost for each program is in line with our current per pupil foundation allowance, so there would not be additional outlay required. The county decided against the EMT certification program as it cost \$2,000 more than our current allotment per pupil. Ms. Gregory also noted that, if approved, this would begin being offered for 2017/18 to interested juniors, so it would be two years before we actually began implementing the 5th year.

Kim Evans, HEA President, spoke during the Call to the Public regarding what the HEA is doing in support of the Sinking Fund election, including sending postcards to district voters and making phone calls.

Breakfast Program 2017/18 Public Hearing May 15, 2017 Prepared by Scott Bacon

The School Code was amended on December 31, 1993 by Public Act 451 to include language mandating all public K-12 school districts to operate a program to make breakfast available. K-12 public schools that had no more than 20% of the pupils in a particular school, as of October of the previous year, that meet the eligibility requirements for free and reduced lunches have the option of holding a hearing to determine public interest, and may justify their decision in writing after the hearing. The Hartland Consolidated Schools October free and reduced percentages are as follows:

In years past we looked at additional transportation costs to get students in 15 minutes earlier every day, the cost of additional aide supervision at the schools, and labor within the Food Service Department and concluded we could never justify the expense considering our contemplated usage by students. We surveyed all district parents in May 2016 by building grade configuration and have found little support for a program. In fact the "no's" were 70%+ in all cases. Nothing has changed to suggest it is feasible/reasonable to offer a district-wide breakfast program in 2017/18.

We are required to provide a breakfast program at LEGACY because of its percent number. This is now the 11th year for this building.

We have had four exceptions for individual buildings. While initially in the 2013/14 school year, the Round Elementary percentage required a breakfast program, for the past few years it has not. We chose to continue the program at Round Elementary because it had been established, although it is not paying for itself and we anticipated that we may discontinue it in the future. At this time we recommend to discontinue the program at Round Elementary school due the cost to the program and the lack of interest by parents and students. Currently, only an average of 8% of the students participate in the program. The program will to cost the food services fund approximately \$6,100.00 for the 2016/17 school year.

Farms Intermediate, Hartland Middle School at Ore Creek, and Hartland High School are also not required to serve breakfast in 2017/18, but we will continue again due to the success of the program over the previous years. These three programs continue to grow and all three offer breakfast with minimal additional labor costs, therefore we can offer the program to the students that chose to participate without losing any money.

The administration's view, for the reasons given above, is to continue to offer breakfast at Farms Intermediate School, Hartland Middle School at Ore Creek, Legacy High School and Hartland High School. We also recommend that we do not offer a breakfast program at the

other schools in the district and to discontinue the current breakfast program at Round Elementary school.

I have published a notice of a hearing in the *Livingston County Daily Press & Argus* and will allow opportunity for public comment.

Lisa Archey has provided, as required by law, information including a sample menu and additional information about the breakfast program.
