Kindergarten Registration 2013-2014

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2013/2014 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2013 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before November 1, 2013. A child who turns 5 after November 1 and before December 1, 2013 may enroll if parent/legal guardian notifies the school district in writing not later than August 1, 2013.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

A twenty-minute Orientation will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room located at the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road, followed by Registration in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

March 5 (Tuesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters A-L March 6 (Wednesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters M-Z Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate
- Original immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox Shots (or proof of having had illness), and vision screening, plus a copy of the record
- Proof of residency-copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/ payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2012 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download the packet from our web site: hartlandschools.us.



Darlene, her husband and three children, moved to Hartland in 1974 from Detroit. She notes that moving from the city to the small town of Hartland, with its one truck stop, bakery, grocery store and lumberyard, not to mention the cows, chickens and tractors, was a "real step back in time." Her children all graduated from Hartland Consolidated Schools, and Darlene shares a bit of that experience, "my children all have wonderful memories of me working in every building they went to...my belief, maybe not theirs. It was often not a good thing because I was easy access for the teachers to stop by my desk and fill me in on my son's sense of humor or to inquire as to the whereabouts of my oldest son. He could generally be found in the auto shop with Mr. Weston."

Most memorable moments:

"I was excited to share the job of class sponsor for the Class of 1993 with my dear friend, Toni Silsbe. I made contact with every one of those students through the four years they grew from freshmen to seniors. What a wonderful experience that was! Even now I get to see some of them when they come to enroll THEIR children in kindergarten and Community Education programs."

"My most exciting experience during all my years in Hartland was being asked to be the Keynote Speaker for the Class of 1991. I was honored that the students voted for me to speak to them because I had been with them from my first day at Round Elementary up until they graduated. My youngest son was in first grade when I started and when he graduated I got to stand up and pour my heart out. It was truly a moment I will always treasure!"

Why are you are still here?

"My heart grows every year because of the friendships I have made with my coworkers and others from this district. I get a real rush when I am out and about and someone comes up to me to give me a hug because they remember me from when they were in school. I am so proud of who I am when someone tells their child that I was their playground lady or office lady. The tears flow for me when they add that they remember the one day that they needed a hug and I was there for them. That is worth so much! I remember back to when I went through a rough time and my "work family" lifted me and carried me through the heartache and made my struggle easier. Where do you find that in the big city life? I am a better person because of the many people that have touched my life through my years in Hartland." Positive thoughts about Hartland Consolidated Schools:

"Over the years there have been so many changes in our district – the addition of buildings, changing of the guard - yet this district has always been centered on the students and their families. How wonderful is it that for over 30 years, I have had an inside view of a very successful operation? If you think about the growth of this district since I started in 1979, there have been many changes to the look of the district, but the core remains the very same. Students, families and the community are what drive our teachers, administrators and support staff to do such an outstanding job."

"The countdown has started for when I will retire and go on to my next "life." look forward to being part of the Hartland Senior Center and remaining friends with my work family. I also look forward to sleeping in and not scraping the snow off my car before taking on the "Hyne Road curves" in the winter."

"One last story of my time in Hartland while my children were attending school.. I got a call from (what was then) the Farms Middle School. It was Mrs. Anderson, the school secretary, and she called me to share something that had just happened. My son, Kris, was serving a detention that day in a room right off of the main office. He went to her desk and asked if he could make a call about his lunch. Well, because we were friends, she allowed him to make the call. Mrs. Anderson assumed that he was calling me. About a half-hour later a pizza delivery man showed up in the office with the pizza my son had ordered ... "

"I am going to miss this place and all of my fellow employees!"





Creating a Trust for Your Pet

Who will care for your dog or cat when you pass away? What will happen to yourbird should you become incapacitated? For many people, providing care for their pet after they pass away or if they become incapacitated is a very big concern, and, as a result, most states including Michigan have statutes that provide for the enforcement of trusts created for the benefit of pets.

Unlike your children or other relatives or friends that you may leave money to via your last will and testament, an animal cannot be a beneficiary of your will. Insteadk, pet owners need to designate someone to take care of their pet after they die and they can leave money to that person for the cost of providing care.

Prior to specific statutes which allow for the creation of an enforceable "pet trust," if an individual left money to a family member or friend in their last will and testament stating in the document that the bequest was solely for the purpose of caring for their pet, the family member or friend would be under no legal obligation to spend the money on their pet. In fact, they could take the pet to the pound and keep the money for themselves if they chose to do so. Any money left in a last will and testament to an individual "for the care of a pet" is merely a request and unenforceable in a court of law.

While many might say, "trust my brother with my dog and I know he would take care of him" – what happens if your brother's son becomes allergic to your dog? Or, what happens if your brother moves into an apartment complex that won't allow pets? A pet trust can provide direction regarding any of the unforeseen circumstances that may arise.

Setting up a trust for your pet is much like setting one up for a person. The trust is a legal entity into which you put money and then designate a trustee who is responsible to safeguard and administer the money. In the case of a pet trust, you designate a caregiver for your pet's expense (special dietary needs, grooming, pet toys, veterinary care, etc.) Of course, it is always a good idea to name one or more alternate trustees and caregivers in the event something should happen to them. In addition, a provision of the trust will need to provide for what happens to the money you have set aside for your pet after its death. Many people choose to have the remaining balance go to the caregiver or a charitable organization.

It is important to keep your trust up to date with current information and to ensure nothing has changed in your designated caregiver's situation that might warrant changing designees (are they still willing to take on the commitment, can they still physically handle the responsibility, etc.) It is also a good idea to give a copy of the trust to your chosen caregiver, any successor(s) and family members who may be involved with the care of your pet.

Creating a trust for your pet is not just for the wealthy or the eccentric. It is a relatively inexpensive and practical way to ensure you have provided for your pet when you can no longer do so because of death or incapacity.



Arthritis Foundation Aquatic Exercise

The Hartland Aquatic Center offers ongoing Arthritis Foundation Aquatic Program classes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 11:30am - 12:20pm.

Instructors are specially trained and certified to gently take your joints through their full range of movement with little or no impact. This is especially important for those with arthritis or other joint issues, but it's also a good place for those who haven't been exercising to get started. Exercising in the water partially neutralizes gravity so you can move more comfortably in the water than on land. Many enjoy a soak in the hot tub after class.

The walk-in rate is \$6.25 for adults or \$5.25 for seniors. Seniors are defined as 55 and better and retired. Frequency cards, which are good for any of our water exercises classes cost \$100 (\$5.00 per class) for adults, and \$85.00 (\$4.25 per class) for seniors.

Class is held in the 86 degree 4-foot pool. No swimming skills are necessary. For those who need assistance, family changing rooms are available and a helper in the water is welcome. Bathing suits are not required and a shirt and shorts are fine. If you mention this article your first class is free.

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
