Superintendent's Message

In 2014 the Michigan Legislature informed the Michigan Department of Education that they needed to create a new standardized assessment that would assess the Common Core State Standards in math and English language arts as well as science and social studies. The assessment, created in less than ten months, is called the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress, or M-STEP.



This new assessment will be given to students in the spring of this year. English language arts and mathematics will be assessed in grades 3-8, science in grades 4 and 7, and social studies in grades 5 and 8. Current 11th grade students will take the ACT Plus Writing, WorkKeys, and M-STEP summative assessments in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. Our students will be taking the majority of these assessments online unless otherwise determined that the student requires a "paper and pencil accommodation" due to a learning disability. The ACT Plus Writing and WorkKeys assessments will continue to be paper and pencil for all students.

Last year, our 8th grade students took the science MEAP online while our 9th graders took the social studies MEAP online. To help prepare for the online assessments the district has been involved in numerous online practice testing activities and has been using Technology Readiness Infrastructure Grants (TRIG) to purchase appropriate computer devices for student use in testing.

Person of the Month

Debbie Laier

Debbie Laier has been a bus driver for Hartland Schools for 18 years. To maintain her CDL license and continue to work for the district, Debbie participates in continuing education provided by the State of Michigan, which includes mandatory monthly trainings, first aid and CPR, mandatory physicals and random drug and alcohol testing.



Debbie's family moved to Hartland when she was five. She and her five brothers were raised here and went to Hartland Schools. Her husband is a Hartland Schools' graduate. They have been married 27 years and have raised seven children in the district. They also have 10 grandchildren, two of which are currently enrolled in Hartland Schools. And yes, she is related to the Laier Farm family! (This is the question she is asked most often.)

Most memorable moment:

"I've had so many memorable moments that stick out in my mind. Probably one of the most memorable was the year our youngest son left for a 15-month tour in Iraq. I needed something else to focus on and I ended up choosing the toughest route in the district. It was the least desirable route from a driver's standpoint and most years, it took multiple drivers to get through the year.

I picked it on purpose, for the challenge and to keep my mind off my son in Iraq. To this day it is STILL the hardest route I've ever taken and this stands out as one of the toughest years. The route had many challenges and some days were very hard. In the end, it was one of the most rewarding years because the kids and I finally gained an understanding and mutual respect for each other. I was the first driver in many years to keep the route for the full year, and I was surprised and touched when the kids asked me to come back to their route the following year."

Why I'm still here:

"I started training to be a bus driver when our youngest son was finishing 3rd grade. I never imagined that I would still be doing it 18 years later. I enjoy the kids, the challenges, the adventure...every day is different! It isn't for everyone; you can't be afraid to drive in the elements, and you have to like kids. Whenever I do finally decide to retire, it will be a very tough day, because I'll miss ALL of it!"

"We are the first people the kids see in the morning as they head out for school, and the last to see them as their school day ends. This job isn't glamorous and most days are thankless, but I work with a great team. From the supervisors, to the dispatchers and bus aides, to my fellow drivers out on the roads in the early morning hours driving in all kinds of road conditions, we work together and look out for each other. I am proud of who we are and proud to be a part of the Hartland Transportation Department.



Fun, Variety and Teamwork

The new teaching team of Tara Yoerg and Tracie Waldron will combine the two talents of these longtime Hartland preschool teachers. Bringing more variety of offered classes, Yoerg and Waldron will be teaching both a 3 and 4 year old class as well as our only Extended Day option for 4-year-olds which runs from 9 am - 1 pm.

“Extended Day really gives us more opportunities,” teacher Tara Yoerg said. “We have extra time to get an extra project in, use the SMART board more, we have time to use the science room, go outside or use the gym.”

While the two instructors will be incorporating science and spanish lessons in their days along with other programs such as Second Step and Education Through Music, making sure the children have fun during their day is priority one.

“It sounds like a lot but it’s so play-based,” teacher Tracie Waldron said. “Our classroom will just flow from one thing to the next. It’s very laid-back and flexible and still centered around just evolving those skills to be social and successful in a classroom setting.”

Helping their students become more independant, develop relationships, learn respect for their peers and teachers while building a foundation of Kindergarten readiness are the goals for the two instructors.

And while class instruction and programs are the focus of their day, it really is the simple things that will always cause the most celebration at this stage.

“It’s great when they get excited by things like getting their own shoes on or getting the zipper up,” Tara Yoerg said. “That’s what makes teaching preschool so fun.”



Highlights of Tara Yoerg/ Tracie Waldron Classroom:

Education Through Music: The five pillars of ETM include music, language, movement, cognitive and social emotional. Children experience songs and games to foster healthy brain development, build community, develop language and melody.

Second Step: is an early learning research based program that uses puppets, songs and activities to help children develop social emotional skills. This includes skills for learning and self regulation, building friendships and problem solving skills.

Zoo-Phonics is one of many ways to teach children phonemic awareness, the building block for literacy. Through active and engaging ways of introducing our letters, children will learn letter sounds and blending. Each letter has an animal, action and a sound associated with it. Our goal is for your children to learn and enjoy our Zoo-Phonics friends.

Handwriting Without Tears: Research supports the active teaching of handwriting. Recent findings demonstrate that writing by hand improves creative writing skills and fine motor skills. Each child has to manipulate tools to create Upper and Lowercase letters.

What is a Special Needs Trust?

While the majority of the clients we see love their children equally and wish to treat them equally when they die, there are circumstances where this is not a good idea. One of those circumstances is where a child has "issues." Issues, in this context usually meant that he or she has a developmental disability that may last for their lifetime and now or later they may need government assistance. Issues could also mean that he or she has an alcohol or drug dependency and also may need government assistance, or worse yet, may use their inheritance to further their addiction with a terrible ending.

Although it may seem like a good idea, I strongly discourage people from establishing custodial accounts or leaving cash or other assets outright to heirs with disabilities, if they are or will receive benefits

from the State. The distribution of assets outright may disqualify the beneficiary from government assistance, which is means-based.

When the assets of an individual with special needs exceed the governmental financial resource limits, the individual may be disqualified from both Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Medicaid.

A more appropriate way to pass an inheritance to a special needs beneficiary is to utilize a Supplemental Needs Trust, also known as a Special Needs Trust. Supplemental Needs Trusts can be either self-settled Trusts, or third-party Trusts. A self-settled Trust is a Trust set up with the disabled persons own assets. The disabled individual is the Grantor and the beneficiary. A third-party Trust is created by one person

(the Grantor) for the benefit of another, so long as the Grantor is not legally responsible for providing support for the disabled individual.

A Supplemental Needs Trust containing certain provisions may be established to administer and distribute Trust assets to a beneficiary with special needs without otherwise disqualifying them from governmental benefits. If drafted properly, the assets in the Trust are not counted for the purpose of determining eligibility for governmental benefits. A properly drafted self-settled Supplemental Needs Trust will require the Trust to pay back the government after the death of the special needs individual for governmental benefits provided to the individual. If the assets are depleted then they do not need be reimbursed. Supplemental Needs Trusts should


be drafted with care. The instrument should not direct the Trustee to make disbursements for a disabled person's health, maintenance or support as this will cause the Trust assets to be includable in determining eligibility for governmental benefits. One way to accomplish this goal is to give the Trustee absolute discretion on disbursements. When distributions are up to the Trustee's sole and absolute discretion, the assets in the Trust are not counted when calculating eligibility for governmental benefits.

Supplemental Needs Trust can be a valuable tool in planning for disabled individuals. The process requires consideration of many issues and should be approached with care by a qualified professional.
