Lakes Elementary School

Several teachers from Lakes spent part of their summer working on honing their instructional skills at various conferences and training sessions. We very much appreciate their dedication towards their craft that will only enhance the learning of our students here at Lakes. Some of the training is listed below:

- 2nd grade teacher Lisa Villar, 4th grade teacher Katie Culbert, and Speech and Language Pathologist Deb Lonergan attended a training session at the Oakland County ISD the week of July 11. The training was titled, "Explicit Instruction: Effective and Efficient Teaching" with Anita Archer. Dr. Archer is a leading expert on how to design and deliver effective lessons that have been shown to promote achievement for all students.
- 2nd grade teacher Jenna Haller was accepted to the Writing Institute provided by the Teachers College Reading and Writing Project at Columbia University in New York City the week of August 1. This is an intensive training session on the writing workshop model presented by Lucy Calkins, the Founding Director of The Teachers College Reading and Writing Project. This is Jenna's second summer attending the institute.
- New 4th grade teacher Jammie Tocalis attended a four day Assessment Literacy Training the week of August 8. This CASL (Classroom Assessment for Student Learning) training focused on helping teachers use the assessment process and alignment of instruction to create sound formative and summative assessments, and using assessment results to effectively improve student achievement. Jammie will be continuing her training and work at CASL meetings throughout the school year.
- Special Education teacher Doreen Avenall is currently beginning extensive Reading Recovery Training through the Hartland CARES Grant along with several other teachers in the Hartland District. This intensive training will allow Dr. Avenall to provide Reading Recovery interventions to more 1st grade students at Lakes in addition to our current Reading Recovery teacher Yvonne Mato.
- Kindergarten teacher Beth Maurin is once again teaching an Education Through Music (ETM) class to several teachers in Hartland. Teachers who are trained in ETM are able to teach self-regulation, literacy, problem-solving, social skills, and more through movement, song, and play. Several kindergarten and 1st grade teachers from Lakes have taken this course and are taking it again this fall. Teachers take 9 three-hour sessions in the evenings and on Saturdays to complete the course.

Round Elementary School

Did you know that flexible seating can enhance student focus? In addition to "traditional" seating options, children can select "flexible" seating to complete work. There are many options such as: desks that allow students to stand, floor seating with low tables or clipboards, and beanbag chairs, small balls, stools, pillows and benches to sit on at tables or desks. Flexible seating allows children the opportunity to focus and do their best work because they are comfortable. Mrs. Vincent is trying "flexible" seating in her kindergarten classroom. Did you know that the Hartland Schools' Student Nutrition offices are housed at Village Elementary School? Lisa Archey is the Director of Student Nutrition Services for Hartland Schools and oversees the district's nutrition department, making sure that our district is in compliance with all state and federal nutrition guidelines. Our nutrition department is responsible for coordinating healthy breakfast and lunch options for our students on a daily basis, typically about 1,800 meals per day. While each school prepares its own meals for students, our nutrition department is responsible for menu planning and ordering of needed supplies and ingredients that are delivered to the central kitchen (at Hartland High School) and then distributed to each school's kitchen for preparation.
