Hartland Unified Basketball:

Hartland played Berkley HS Unified at Little Caesars Arena on March 17, 2024 following the Pistons game. It was a late night, but everyone did a super job.



Pesticide and Herbicide Applications: You may recall that last year the district was made aware of an issue with herbicide application at Creekside Elementary done by a non-Hartland Schools organization contracted company. The State of Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) completed an investigation based on four parent complaints. They found that "HCS staff appear to be in compliance with commercial applicator certification requirements." They found that on May 5, 2023, application performed by the outside contractor was not "made in compliance with regulations" that restrict applying products within 100 feet of occupied classrooms. They found the contractor to be "responsible for this violation."

The MDARD found that HCS was in violation of posting notices that used "district-wide" instead of using specific location language. They also noted that the district needed to include "product concentration mixture, amount of end use dilution applied, and rate of application" on the advanced notices. This will be corrected going forward. The district determined that we would discontinue the practice of allowing organizations to contract for application on playing fields. The district will contract for all applications. It is important to note that costs may increase for those wishing to have application for weed control and fertilizer on fields they use.

Below, I have shared a calendar of herbicide application for the purpose of weed control for sidewalks, parking lot cracks and fence lines; as well as, weed control (ex. dandelions), mole control and fertilizer. Our maintenance staff will ensure notifications are timely, location specific, and applications are only done where no one is present, wind conditions are appropriate, and when all liquids have adequate time to dry. Regarding pesticides (wasps, ants, etc.), this will only be done as a last resort by a contracted licensed application company with expectations in place to comply with all MDARD requirements.

Stress and Anxiety:



Is it stress or anxiety?

Stress

- Generally is a response to an external cause, such as taking a big test or arguing with a friend.
- Goes away once the situation is resolved.
- Can be positive or negative. For example, it may inspire you to meet a deadline, or it may cause you to lose sleep.

Both Stress and **Anxiety**

Both stress and anxiety can affect your mind and body. You may experience symptoms such as:

- Excessive worry
- Uneasiness
- Tension
- · Headaches or body pain
- · High blood pressure
- · Loss of sleep

Anxiety

- Generally is internal, meaning it's your reaction to stress.
 - Usually involves a persistent feeling of apprehension or dread that doesn't go away, and that interferes with how you live your life.
- Is constant, even if there is no immediate threat.

Ways to Cope

- · Keep a journal.
- · Download an app with relaxation exercises.
- · Exercise and eat healthy.
- · Get regular sleep.
- · Avoid excess caffeine.
- Identify and challenge your negative thoughts.
- · Reach out to your friends or family.
